How is your Parish doing in moving towards reducing carbon emissions?

Here are 2 steps every parish could take:

Complete the Energy Footprint Tool and take the first steps to carbon net zero

Carbon net zero is a pledge that the whole of the Church of England has signed up to achieving by 2030. The Energy Footprint Tool is a great way of monitoring your church building's carbon usage and energy efficiency and an essential way of the Diocese monitoring its whole carbon footprint, and seeing where we can help.

Please take some time to upload your figures for 2023. There are several different ways to do this so you can pick which is easiest for you, and if you need help just email environment@peterborough-diocese.org.uk and Jo Ormston will be happy to help guide you.

Eco Church - A Rocha UK's award scheme for churches in England and Wales



Once you've completed the Energy Footprint Tool, take the next step and register your church with Eco Church, an amazing award created by A Rocha UK. It is completely free of charge for parishes to use and the survey and resources have been created to help equip and guide churches in their environmental journey. All actions taken, both little and large, count towards a prestigious Eco Church Award at Bronze, Silver or Gold level. Across the Diocese there are currently 48 churches registered with Eco Church, with 14 already having received their bronze award and six, their silver. Register your church today.

Dear Friends,

Sitting around a firepit at Launde Abbey last week, the leader encouraged us to share stories. I was joining the ordination retreat and accompanying those who were to be ordained as priests and deacons. Whether it was the cool evening breeze, the beauty of the landscape, the flicker of the fire, there was something in the atmosphere, and I dare to suggest it may have been God's hand at work, that allowed each person to speak of moments of significance in their faith journey.



Storytelling has a long tradition, especially sitting round fires. When we tell stories, we draw people into a place of openness and wonder, listening to different experiences and even different cultures. Our imaginations are taken to new places and we can put ourselves in someone else's shoes for a moment. Our horizons are widened and we are brought closer in fellowship.

Jesus told many stories – he spoke of things familiar to help people understand the Kingdom of God – and spoke in ways that encouraged people to ask further questions. 'The Kingdom of God is like a mustard seed, a man who scatters seed on the ground, a woman who loses a coin and searches the house for it...' Perhaps you know many of these stories, perhaps you only know a few, but each time we read them we are able to gain insights into the nature of God and are filled afresh with wonder and awe. Jesus shares his story and we too can share ours. I wonder how we can find those firepit moments when we, too, can sit and listen to others and dare to say something of our own experience of God's love in our own lives.

You will see my invitation to our celebration of 30 years of Women's Ministry in this edition of PDN. I look forward to welcoming you to the Cathedral in September where we can share the stories of women's ministry in our Diocese and celebrate the impact that ministry has had on our lives and our communities.

What's been going on in Ridlington . . . (from page YYYY)

Ridlington PCC applied to the Community Giving Fund for a grant to defray the costs of establishing a “pollen bar” - seeking to establish planting in the churchyard so that a pollen source would be available for the majority of the months of the year. By increasing pollen for insects we hope to increase the number and types of birds and bats frequenting the churchyard.

As part of our work as an Eco Church we have undertaken an annual “bio blitz” for a number of years so can see how the management of the churchyard affects biodiversity and having established a base line we can take steps to improve biodiversity.

And I heard on Sunday that swifts have been seen in church, 2 years after having installed swift nesting boxes on the north side of the church. How gratifying that the ideas and work to implement them is bearing fruit and being enjoyed by swifts!

Portrait of His Majesty The King

Support for parishes from the Diocese

A team from the Diocese came to Empingham on 17-6-24 and spoke about ways they can help us. Most of our parishes were represented.

Here are a few notes I made (but no guarantees my slow left-handed scribble is fully accurate) :

‘Context: we face challenges with finding volunteers, finances, buildings

There are also many good things going on in the churches of the Diocese

Parish Share: this has been level for 4 years; about 80% of the amount requested is being paid; the Diocese is using reserves but cannot do so for many more years

Working together, there are many areas Parishes and the Diocesan support staff are addressing the challenges through different areas, e.g.

Communications—sharing encouraging news

Being transparent about financial challenges

Encouraging generosity

Measuring the impact of initiatives

Generous Giving team has been helping parishes install electronic giving machines, which typically receive about £100/month. Having a QR code let people give from their phones was mentioned too.

For a fee of typically £25/month the Diocese will undertake the bookkeeping aspect of the Treasurer’ role.

The teams focussing on Mission, children/young people, communications, finance, vocations etc. are all available to help PARISHES. Take home message: ask

News from the Foodbank, early summer 2024

The headlines

In the last 12 months (1st April 2023 - 31st March 2024) the Rutland Foodbank received 820 referrals requesting emergency food parcels for households across Rutland struggling to get by on low incomes. This is a 15% increase in the number referrals compared to the previous year, as more and more people struggle to afford essentials such as food.

-
- The referrals were residents living in 305 households across Rutland.
- 121 (15%) of the referrals were for new households who had not previously been helped by the Rutland Foodbank.
- Of concern, 446 (57%) of the parcels were provided to households which included children.
- Nearly 27% of the parcels were provided to those in work but struggling to afford food, this was a 7% increase compared with 2022-23.
- The levels of need were particularly acute in January 2024 which was the busiest month for Rutland Foodbank, with 82 emergency food parcels provided by volunteers.
- Nearly 40% of households only needed to be helped once during the year but there were some that needed more emergency help. In all we sent emergency food parcels to 1189 adults and 850 children, not forgetting their household pets.
- Ingredients for over 43,000 meals were distributed.

Over 31,300 kg of donated items were sent out across Rutland.
